What first inspired you to become foster parents?

Tiffany: We felt like God was leading us to foster, so we started praying about it and immediately knew that this was what we were supposed to be doing!

What do you think is the most rewarding aspect of being a foster parent?

Tiffany: I would say just being a constant in a child's life, loving them, and supporting them has been the most rewarding aspect so far. The biggest highlight for us has been the smiling faces of these children when we pick them up from school in the afternoons!

What do you think is the most challenging aspect of being a foster parent?

Tiffany: The most challenging aspect of being a foster parent is the lack of knowledge that most other people have about the foster system in general.

What advice would you give to someone who is considering becoming a foster parent?

Tiffany: If you are considering becoming a foster parent, my suggestion is to just do it! It can be challenging at times, but it's also very rewarding. Being able to help children in need has been such a huge blessing to us!

What is something that surprised you about foster parenting?

Tiffany: Everything! I don't think you truly understand the need for foster parents until you actually become one. You can be a positive influence in the lives of these children, and to show them love and compassion that they may not have had before. It will truly warm your heart.

Is there anything else you want others to know about fostering?



Tiffany: Fostering is ugly, it's beautiful, it's ups and downs, it's love, it's all of those emotions into one. It will be the hardest, most rewarding thing you will ever do!

The unselfishness of a mother's love brought much joy to an adoptive family this September. Within our Private Adoption Program, our adoption coordinator received a call from a birth mother on September 18, 2023. She explained she wanted a better life for her newborn son, a life she was unable to give him at that time. Her baby had been born that morning at 3:11 a.m. at Grady Memorial Hospital, weighand measuring 18.5 inches long

Joseph and Bronwen O'Dell were approved as adoptive parents in July 2023. They were anxiously waiting when they received a call about the newborn baby boy. Providential timing brought baby Amos to his parents on the evening of our Celebration Banquet. Bronwen accepted Amos into her arms with tears of a mother's joy.

The O'Dells congregation, the Woodstock Church of Christ, rejoiced with this growing family and played an important role in welcoming Amos to his forever home.

Like Amos, my life was transformed through adoption. In 1983, as an abandoned six-year-old, streetwise, and physically abused orphan, I was chosen to be adopted by a single mother. From that moment, God blessed me and continues to bless me because I was adopted. Adoption is so special. Most people who have never witnessed such an expression of love can never comprehend how wonderful adoption truly can be. It is different from giving birth because, as a parent, you receive the gift from God in seeing and receiving the opportunity to say yes to a particular child.

From day one, my adopted mother told me I was adopted. As a child, I would ask her, "Why did you adopt me?" She would answer me with, "I saw your picture among all the children. I chose you. You were beautiful." Her words always made me feel special. This is adoption, a true statement of God's everlasting love.

Thanksgiving and Christmas! A time of year we celebrate the joy of the season with thankful and grateful hearts in the company of family and special friends. For many foster children, the holiday season this year is either their first time away from their own family or perhaps their first time in their current foster

home. For older children, this may be the second, third, or more foster home they've been in. They feel cut off from their own family, not knowing what to heir new surroundings.

While there is a significant reason they are not living with their biological family in that moment, most foster children still love and deeply miss the only family they have known. Have you ever been away from your family during the holidays with little-to-no idea what's going to happen next with people you've never met? You would have so many questions: *Where will I be each day? Who will I go visit next? Will I be expected to participate in gatherings with people I've never met? What unfamiliar traditions will I be expected to participate in?*

Children commonly struggle this time of year with anxiety and depression. That fact is only heightened among foster children who are away from their family and their personal holiday history. Also, they are with a family they do not know and have had no say in the decision that brought them there. Foster children often report feeling especially vulnerable, lonely, and sad, at
