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Your Opportunity to Say "Yes"

You've read about the numerous calls that we receive from the Division of Family and Children Services (DFCS) asking for our help. They call us because they need good homes to provide care for children who have to be removed from their biological families. Resources tend to be limited and they're hoping and praying that we don't say that dreaded phrase: "I'm sorry but we don't have a family that can help these children." With that response, we are essentially saying, "No. We can't help you this time, maybe next time."

Well, "next time" came around and Agape was able to contact one of our foster families. This family was new to fostering and had only been certified for about 2 weeks. They were eager to start and immediately said "yes" to helping a family in need. They said "yes" to helping a 2-year-old child who had biological parents with illegal substance abuse issues; a family that couldn't provide adequate care for their child; and had no extended family members that were able to help.

These foster parents welcomed that child into their home and involved the birth family in the child's care (medical visits, weekly phone calls and providing moral support). Unfortunately, the time came when it was decided that the birth parents would not be able to take care of this child. Although it had come this point, the birth mother was encouraged and hopeful about this family taking care of her son. This foster family decided that they had already said "yes" once to helping the family and would say "yes" again to make that child a permanent member of their family.

We know that all cases don't end in adoption. Some foster parents make significant impacts on the lives of children in their home, and then these children are able to be reunited with their birth families. Some children are adopted by other families. However, we need more families like this who are willing to say "yes" when Georgia Agape receives that call. Guilt

We have all experienced that feeling that we are responsible for hurting or offending someone. The 'guilt' we feel is in direct relation to our behavior. The closer we are to another person, the more likely we are to hurt them. We are all human and we say or do things that hurt one another. Sometimes by accident, other times by intention. 'Guilt' can be defined as: a cognitive realization and/or feeling of responsibility for some offense or wrong against another individual. We can even imagine that we are guilty even when we are not. What we do with the guilt we feel will have a lasting affect

on our lives.

There are many examples in scripture that illustrate one's response to guilt. Guilt can be good if we acknowledge our wrongs and seek to do better. It is not good if we respond negatively. Adam and Eve tried to hide from God when their guilt was apparent. King David, when confronted by Nathan the Prophet, showed remorse and repented. These examples, and others, show guilt is a powerful emotion that can influence how we behave after offending or hurting someone. We may be compelled to attempt to make things right with the other individual. If we turn inward, the guilt might grow into resentment and/or depression. There are even times that the guilt itself is unfounded, meaning we really do not have any responsibility for the offense or pain of another. This can also lead to inappropriate behavior.

Often there is the need to seek advice from a therapist. The first part of this discussion will center around the question, 'Is the guilt appropriate?' 'Do I hold responsibility for the offense or pain that was caused?' After that, the discussion will be to determine the appropriate response to the guilt you hold. 

A Single Person's Role As Parent

When individuals reach out to Agape to become foster or adoptive parents, they often come with a barrage of questions. After all, this is a new process for many and they wish to know the ins and outs, ups and downs, the good and the bad.

But, the question that we have received more often lately is, "Can I be a foster parent or adoptive parent if I'm single?"

The answer to this is very simply: Yes. Many of our current and former foster and adoptive parents are single and have done wonderful jobs caring for the children in their homes. In fact, the vast majority of our current, potential foster parents (foster homes "under study") are single women. And some of our greatest success stories of adoption from foster care included a single parent.

Agape works with the local Churches of Christ to recruit new foster and adoptive parents. Many times, I am in awe of the individuals who reach out to us saying that they "just want to help" or "want to have an impact". These are individuals who have found some room in their hearts and homes and are actually taking steps to care for children in need. And it's a wonderful thing to know that there are Christians out there who look past the potentially scary and

intimidating to make a difference in the life of a child. Ideally, anyone who becomes a foster parent has an established support system including their family, friends and church members, but many times we see friendships established in our training classes. We have been witnesses to several relationships developed between our potential foster and adoptive parents based on the common ground of being Christians who care for children. It doesn't matter if they are able to parent biologically, through foster care or through adoption. They just want to *parent*.



I have just recently hit my first 100 days at Agape. It has been a busy few weeks. In just 4 months, I have had some amazing experiences. I have met many memorable Christians on my journey, met dozens of elders, been blessed by God's word at numerous congregations, and participated in ladies Bible studies and Retreats. I have attended events at all 3 professional organizations we hold memberships with and met staff from Church of Christ organizations across the country. I've visited the homes of many of our foster parents and had play-time and conversations with many of our foster children. Yet I am still just getting started.

One of the most memorable and standout experiences of my short time here happened just recently. I had the amazing opportunity to be a part of the creation of a family. Just a few weeks back, a birth mother contacted our agency after making the decision to make an adoption plan for her child. She was in the midst of labor and was asking us to come to the hospital. Within hours of delivery, there I stood in the hospital room with the birth mom, this precious newborn and two of my staff. I can't put into words the feeling of that moment. It was a solemn and serious, yet beautiful moment in

time. Fast forward just a few short weeks and there I stood again about to witness one of those moments that will always remain with me. In the Agape office, I was blessed and honored to watch as adoptive mom and dad laid eyes on their beautiful son for the very first time. Again, no words to describe the moment. To see the baby lock eyes with his parents for the very first time made my eyes water and my heart flutter. God answers prayers.

It has been a very busy yet rewarding first few months. So many of you have been overwhelmingly supportive and encouraging. I thank every one of you. Still, I have many more of you to meet and visit. During the next few months, I will be spending my time doing just that.

The very first month of our third quarter is National Foster Care Month. This is the time to take in the gravity of foster care in our country. According to The Annie E. Casey Foundation, there are nearly 428,000 children in care in the United States on any given day. In Georgia alone, there are nearly 14,000 children in care today.
